• This seminal implementation science article offers an defines implementation strategies and their role within implementation science. The article differentiates implementation strategies from practice or treatment strategies.

• This article compiles 73 implementation strategies from prior research, with information about their application. This article is a useful resource for researchers aiming to learn about different implementation strategies and identify strategies that may apply to their own research.

Examples of Studies Evaluating the Use of Various Implementation Strategies

A Realist Review of Interventions and Strategies to Promote Evidence-Informed Healthcare: A Focus on Change Agency

• This literature review describes which characteristics of 'change agency' (or leaders) work, for whom, and why. This article is useful for researchers planning to implement interventions using a clinical champion or other key leader.

<u>The Effectiveness of Clinical Guideline Implementation Strategies – A Synthesis of Systematic Review Findings</u>

Prior M, Guerin M, Grimmer-Somers K. The Effectiveness of Clinical Guideline Implementation Strategies - A Synthesis of Systematic Review Findings. *Journal of Evaluation in Clinical Practice*. 2008;14(5):888-897.

 This systematic review analyzed which implementation strategies were effective or ineffective in changing provider adherence to clinical guidelines. Authors found that combining different strategies was most effective, while individual didactic lectures were ineffective. This is a useful article to learn about implementation strategies to change provider behavior.

A Systematic Review of Hand Hygiene Improvement Strategies: A Behavioural Approach

 In this systematic review of improvement strategies to change provider hand washing behavior, authors found that a combination strategies worked best, but there were 'hidden and valuable' nuances of these combinations that were distinct and important in each study. This paper is a useful example of strategies to change provider behavior and could be helpful when designing studies focused on one specific provider behavior.

• In this study, researchers compared two different implementation strategies (social and financial incentives) to change provider implementation of cognitive behavioral therapy. This study demonstrates how researchers can structure a study to compare two different implementation strategies.

<u>Using a multi-state Learning Community as an implementation strategy for immediate</u> postpartum long-acting reversible contraception

 Researchers studied the facilitators and barriers of utilizing the implementation strategy of a Learning Community to increase state's capacity to increase access longacting reversible contraception care. Findings showed that Learning Communities are a potentially impactful implementation strategy, as they created structure and accountability and incorporate other implementation strategies. This study demonstrates the specific study of an implementation strategy rather than an intervention.
