# PAPER FROM THE HOUSE

The House Bill relative to language opportunity for our kids (House, No. 3740, amended),— came from the House with the endorsement that the House had NON-concurred in the further Senate amendment (striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate, No. 2134), and had asked for a committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two branches; and that Representative Peisch of Wellesley, Moran of Lawrence and Ferguson of Holden have been appointed the committee on the part of the House.

On motion of Mr. Tarr, the Senate insisted on its amendment and concurred in the appointment of a committee of conference; and Senators Chang-Diaz, DiDomenico and O'Connor were appointed on the part of the Senate.

The bill was returned to the House endorsed accordingly.
