Papers from the Senate.

The House Bill relative to language opportunity for our kids (House, No. 3740), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment, striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate document numbered 2134.

Language opportunity.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Ms. Peisch of Wellesley, the

amendment was considered forthwith. The House then non-concurred with the Senate in its amendment; and, on motion of the same member, appointed a committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two branches. Representatives Peisch, Moran of Lawrence and Ferguson of Holden then were appointed the committee on the part of the House. Sent to the Senate to be joined.

Subsequently notice was received from the Senate that said branch had insisted on its amendment, concurred with the House in the appointment of a committee of conference; and that Senators Chang-Diaz, DiDomenico and O'Connor had been joined as the committee on the part of the Senate.

A Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Renee Salisbury, an employee of the Department of Transitional Assistance (Senate, No. 2101, amended in line 4 by inserting after the word "Salisbury", the first time it appears, the words "to care for her child"; and by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

Renee Salisbury, sick leave.

"Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to establish forthwith a sick leave bank for a certain employee of the department of transitional assistance, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.") (on a petition), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for said committee, then reported that the matter be scheduled for consideration by the House.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Garballey of Arlington, the bill was read a second time forthwith; and it was ordered to a third reading.
