

JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Monday, April 10, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by Father Rick Walsh of the Paulist Center of Boston, Chaplain of the House, as follows:

Prayer. God of All that is Good and Just, we ask Your blessings for the men and women who labor in and through this House Chamber. May their efforts benefit the citizens of Massachusetts.

Today we remember the birth of Frances Perkins. Born in Boston in 1880, raised in Worcester, graduate of Holyoke College, Perkins served for 12 years as the Secretary of Labor during President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's 4 terms, the first woman to hold a cabinet post.

As the United States faced the Great Depression, Frances Perkins drew up the policies for the establishment of immediate federal aid to the states for unemployment relief, and helped craft the extensive program of public works that put many Americans to work. She oversaw the development of a federal law of minimum wages, maximum hours, unemployment insurance, as well as the Social Security Act, and the abolition of child labor.

We give thanks for this remarkable daughter of Massachusetts. May God continue to bless our Commonwealth.

The Minority Leader announced that he had appointed Gloria Leipzig of Belmont as his designee to serve on the special commission established (under Chapter 2 of the Resolves of 2016) to make an investigation and study of the prevalence and impact of the bullying of tenants, with a focus on elderly and disabled tenants, in public and subsidized multi-family housing.

Paper from the Senate.

A petition (accompanied by bill) of Mark C. Montigny and Antonio F. D. Cabral for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Gail Normandin, an employee of the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development, came from the Senate referred, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on Public Service. The House then concurred with the Senate in the suspension of said rule; and the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 2049) was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Public Service.

Of so much of the recommendations of the Department of the State Treasurer (House, No. 23) as relates to enhancing consumer protection Unclaimed property.

with respect to unclaimed property (House, No. 35),— and recommending that the same be referred to the committee on Financial Services.

Mental health care.
Of the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 2269) of Brian J. Coppola relative to establishing psychiatric advance directives for mental health care,— and recommending that the same be referred to the committee on Mental Health, Substance Use and Recovery.

Liquid nicotine,— packaging.
Of the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 835) of Jonathan Hecht and others relative to defining child-resistant packaging of liquid nicotine containers and establishing civil penalties for violations,— and recommending that the same be referred to the committee on Public Health.

Under Rule 42, the reports severally were considered forthwith; and they were accepted. Severally sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Brenda May,— sick leave.
By Mr. Parisella of Beverly, for the committee on Public Service, on a joint petition, a Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Brenda May, an employee of the Department of Children and Families (House, No. 3455).

Angeline Lee,— sick leave.
By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Angeline Lee, an employee of the Department of Children and Families (House, No. 3456).

Monica Bassila,— sick leave.
By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Monica Bassila, an employee of the Department of Public Health (House, No. 3462).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

General Appropriation Bill.
Mr. Dempsey of Haverhill, for the committee on Ways and Means, on House, No. 1, reported, in part, a Bill making appropriations for the fiscal year 2018 for the maintenance of the departments, boards, commissions, institutions and certain activities of the Commonwealth, for interest, sinking fund and serial bond requirements and for certain permanent improvements (House, No. 3600) [Total appropriation: \$40,327,891,863.00]. Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Subsequently Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for said committee, reported that the matter be scheduled for consideration by the House; and, under the provisions of House Order No. 3599, amended, the bill was placed in the Orders of the Day for Monday, April 24, for a second reading.

Emergency Measure.

William Motherway,— sick leave.
The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for William Motherway, an employee of the Trial Court (see House, No. 2792), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 3 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
