MONDAY, DECEMBER 10, 2018.

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Met at eight minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Brownsberger in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Brownsberger), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Senator Nick Collins (pursuant to Section 136 of Chapter 113 of the Acts of 2018) to the Special Commission to make an investigation and study on the feasibility of establishing a Cape Verdean cultural center in the city of Boston; and

Senator Michael O. Moore (pursuant to Section 44 of Chapter 218 of the Acts of 2018) to the Special Commission to make an investigation and study of the cost and feasibility of exempting veterans of the Commonwealth from tuition, fees and associated costs of attending public colleges and universities in the Commonwealth.

PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE

Notice was received from the House of Representatives announcing the following appointment by the Minority Leader:

Representative Randy Hunt (under Chapter 207 of the Acts of 2018) to the Tax Expenditure Commission to examine, evaluate and report on the administration, effectiveness and fiscal impact of tax expenditures.

A petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4990) of David T. Viera, Viriato M. deMacedo and Randy Hunt (by vote of the town) relative to the Bourne Recreation Authority,--was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government

A Bill protecting locked out employees (House, No. 4988, amended,-- on House, No. 3133),-- was read and, under Senate Rule 27, referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

The bill (Senate, No. 137, amended) was then ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed.

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time, ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed.

The bill was read. There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time and ordered to a third reading.

Emergency Preambles Adopted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Laurie Wendover, an employee of the Department of Correction (see Senate, No. 2083, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Brownsberger) and sent to the House for enactment.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Rachael Purnell, an employee of the Trial Court (see House, No. 4980), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Brownsberger) and sent to the House for enactment.

Establishing a sick leave bank for Rachael Purnell, an employee of the Trial Court (House, No. 4980).

Adjournment in Memory of Francis James Kane

The Senator from Middlesex and Worcester, Mr. Eldridge, moved that when the Senate adjourns today, it adjourn in memory of Francis James Kane.

Francis James Kane, 78, a lifelong resident of Marlborough, passed away after a two and a half-year battle with cancer on Friday, Nov. 30, 2018. Fran, as he was known by family and friends, is survived by his high school sweetheart and loving wife of 55 years, Judith M. (Foisy) Kane, his son James Francis Kane and his wife State Representative Hannah Kane of Shrewsbury, and his three grandchildren, Madison, Caitlin, and Patrick. Fran was predeceased by his granddaughter Caroline Libby Kane.

Fran, one of eight children of Francis J. and Susan C. Kane, was born and raised in Marlborough. He is predeceased by four of his siblings, brothers Alden Kane and Roger Kane, and sisters Millicent Morin and Lucille Stevens. Fran is survived by two of his sisters, Susan Scott and her husband Raymond, Sandra Kane, and his brother John Kane and his wife Barbara, all of Marlborough.

Fran was a member of the Marlborough High School Class of 1957, a 1961 graduate of Fitchburg State College, and he received his master's degree in education from Worcester State College in 1966. Beginning his career in education as a teacher in Hudson, Fran went on to serve as a teacher and a principal and he capped his twenty years in the Marlborough Public Schools as superintendent. He also served his community in Marlborough as a member of the Planning Board, the Democratic Town Committee, Rotary and the Jaycees. Fran retired in 2002 as Associate Commissioner at the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.
