Dear Senators Barrett, Creem, and Tarr, and Representatives Roy, Chan, and Jones:

On behalf of the undersigned organizations and our thousands of members and supporters across the Commonwealth, we applaud your work to keep Massachusetts at the forefront of the nation's response to the climate crisis and development of offshore wind.

We are writing to encourage that the committee of conference on energy and climate legislation include a provision allowing Massachusetts communities to participate in offshore wind projects in a way that leads to the deployment of more renewable power.

Many Massachusetts residents, and the communities they live in, want to support, and participate in the Commonwealth's clean energy transition. But there are obstacles to buying this power in a way that supports the addition of new renewable generation. Current policies only support short-term contracts for power through community aggregation, but such contracts are unable to support the financing necessary to drive the addition of new renewable capacity. Additional language is needed to facilitate this goal by enabling Massachusetts communities (those that so choose) to contract for ten years or more for power in a way that supports financing of additional renewable generation.

A provision from the recently passed House bill would provide these aggregation programs the ability to enter long term contracts with offshore wind developers. Through this proposed language, the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center (Mass CEC) could work with aggregators to provide the necessary long-term financial backstop offshore wind developers would need to secure financing and develop additional wind turbines. An example of this would be Mass CEC supporting a Letter of Credit or similar financial mechanism to backstop a long-term contract.

We support the following language from Section 11 of H. 4524, with the deletion of a reference to possible resale (per the suggestion of Mass CEC). The language is as follows:

(10) authorize, by a vote of the board, and operate a program to secure, leverage, or otherwise guarantee long-term purchases of energy and renewable energy certificates from offshore wind developers for direct sale, or resale by the center, to a municipality or group of municipalities with an approved municipal load aggregation plan pursuant to section 134 of chapter 164,

aggregations pursuant to section 137 of said chapter 164 and other private aggregations with plans approved by the center
