Senate, July 17, 2014— Text of the Senate amendment to the House Bill House Bill relative to the reduction of gun violence (House, No. 4285) (being the text of Senate, No. 2265, printed as amended)

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Fourteen

1 SECTION 1. Section 167A of chapter 6 of the General Laws, amended by section 1 of
2 chapter 77 of the acts of 2013, is hereby amended by adding the following subsection:-

3 (h) Notwithstanding any general or special law, to the contrary, the department shall
4 transmit to the attorney general of the United States any information in its control required or
5 permitted under federal law to be included in the National Instant Criminal Background Check
6 System or any successor system maintained to conduct background checks for firearms sales or
7 licensing. No more information than is necessary for the purposes stated above shall be
8 transmitted and such information shall not be considered a public record under clause Twenty-
9 sixth of section 7 of chapter 4 and section 10 of chapter 66.

10 SECTION 2. Subsection (a) of section 172 of said chapter 6, as appearing in the 2012
11 Official Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following clause:-

12 (31) A person licensed pursuant to section 122 of chapter 140 may obtain from the
13 department data permitted under section 172L.

14 SECTION 3. Said chapter 6 is hereby further amended by inserting after section 172K
15 the following section:-

16 Section 172L. Notwithstanding section 172 or any other general or special law to the
17 contrary, a person licensed pursuant to section 122 of chapter 140 shall obtain from the
18 department all available criminal offender record information prior to accepting a person as an
19 employee to determine the suitability of such employee who may have direct and unmonitored
20 contact with firearms, shotguns or rifles. A person obtaining information pursuant to this section
21 shall not disseminate such information for any purpose other than the further protection of public
22 safety.

23 SECTION 4. Section 18 ³/₄ of chapter 6A of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2012
24 Official Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following clause:-

25 (10) to develop a biennial report to be sent to the clerks of the house of representatives
26 and senate, the house and senate committees on ways and means and the house and senate chairs
27 of the joint committee on public safety and homeland security not later than March 1 of every
28 even-numbered year. The report shall contain, but not be limited to, the following information:
29 (i) statistics related to firearms crimes; (ii) arrests and prosecutions of firearms-related offenses,
30 to serve as an examination of the effectiveness of the commonwealth's firearms-related
31 regulations; (iii) aggregate data on the source of firearms that have been confiscated and
32 identified as being used in a crime or in an attempted or completed suicide during the report
33 period, including aggregate information on the manufacturer, state of origin and last known point
34 of sale, transfer, loss or theft of such firearms; (iv) an explanation of substantial changes in state
35 and federal firearms-related laws and firearms-related statistics in the commonwealth; (v)
36 information and statistics concerning the number of transactions annually involving multiple
37 purchases of firearms or the purchase by the same licensee of 5 or more firearms in a 4-month
38 period including an analysis of whether such firearms were used in a crime as identified and
39 reported on in section 131Q of chapter 140; and (vi) the effectiveness of section 128B of chapter
40 140.

41 SECTION 5. Section 6 of chapter 22C of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
42 amended by adding the following paragraph:-

43 Subject to appropriation, the commonwealth fusion center shall assist the offices of the
44 attorney general and district attorneys in the investigation and prosecution of state firearm
45 crimes; provided, however, that the colonel may establish within the division a special unit
46 known as the criminal firearms and trafficking unit to assist the offices of the attorney general
47 and district attorneys in the investigation and prosecution of state firearm crimes.

48 SECTION 6. Subsection (a) of section 8A of chapter 69 of the General Laws, as so
49 appearing, is hereby amended by striking out the third paragraph and inserting in place thereof
50 the following paragraph:-

51 Plans shall be developed in consultation with the school principal, school nurse, school
52 athletic director, team physicians, coaches, trainers and local police, fire and emergency
53 personnel, as appropriate. Schools shall practice the response sequence at the beginning of each
54 school year and periodically throughout the year and evaluate and modify the plan as necessary.
55 School officials shall review the response sequence with local fire and police officials at least 1
56 time each year and shall conduct periodic walk-throughs of school campuses. Plans shall be
57 submitted once every 3 years to the department of elementary and secondary education, the local
58 police department and the local fire department not later than September 1. Plans shall be
59 updated in the event of new construction or physical changes to the school campus as determined
60 by the local police department.

61 SECTION 7. Section 3A of chapter 70B of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
62 amended by striking out subsection (a) and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:-

63 There shall be a school building advisory board comprised of: the state auditor or a
64 designee; the inspector general or a designee; the superintendent of the state police or a designee;
65 the state fire marshal or a designee; the director of the Massachusetts emergency management
66 agency; the executive director of the authority, who shall serve as the secretary to the advisory
67 board and shall be a nonvoting member of the board; and 17 members to be appointed by and
68 represent the following nongovernmental organizations: Massachusetts Municipal Association,
69 Inc., Massachusetts Association of School Committees, Inc., the Massachusetts Mayors
70 Association, Inc., Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents, Inc., Massachusetts
71 Association of Regional Schools, Inc., Massachusetts Building Trades Council, the
72 Massachusetts chapter of Associated Builders & Contractors, Inc., Massachusetts Alliance for
73 Small Contractors, American Council of Engineering Companies of Massachusetts, Associated
74 Subcontractors of Massachusetts, Inc., American Institute of Architects-Massachusetts,
75 Massachusetts Smart Growth Alliance, Massachusetts Taxpayers Foundation, Inc., Associated
76 General Contractors of Massachusetts, Inc., Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association
77 Incorporated, Fire Chiefs' Association of Massachusetts, Inc. and acting jointly, the
78 Massachusetts Teachers Association and Massachusetts Federation of Teachers. The advisory
79 board shall assist the authority in the development of general policy regarding school building
80 construction, renovation, reconstruction, maintenance and facility space, preservation of open
81 space and minimization of loss of open space, thoughtful community development, cost
82 management, adequate provisions for safety and security and shall provide technical advice and
83 input to the authority. The advisory board shall meet at least quarterly.

84 SECTION 8. Section 14 of said chapter 70B, as so appearing, is hereby amended by
85 inserting after the word "equipment", in line 5, the following words:- , including upgrades and
86 technological devices necessary for enhanced safety and security.

87 SECTION 9. Said chapter 70B of the General Laws is hereby further amended by adding
88 following section:-

89 Section 20. The authority shall, in cooperation with a school district or municipality,
90 submit plans or blueprints approved by the authority, associated with approved construction,
91 renovation or reconstruction of a school building, to the local police department, fire department,
92 Massachusetts emergency management agency and any regional law enforcement entity. The
93 plans shall identify points of entry into a school building, emergency access routes for ingress or
94 egress and other public safety features, including, but not limited to: fire hydrants, utility access
95 points and stairwells. Any department in receipt of such plans may submit comments to the
96 authority and school district. Upon completion of the approved construction, the authority shall,
97 in cooperation with a school district or municipality, submit updated, as-built plans to the local
98 police department, fire department, Massachusetts emergency management agency and any

99 regional law enforcement entity, a copy of which shall be maintained on file by each department
100 or agency in receipt of the plans. Plans submitted pursuant to this section shall be deemed
101 confidential and shall not be considered public records under clause Twenty-sixth of section 7 of
102 chapter 4.

103 SECTION 10. Chapter 71 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
104 section 37O the following 3 sections:-

105 Section 37P. (a) As used in this section the following words shall have the following
106 meanings, unless the context clearly requires otherwise:-

107 “Chief of police”, the chief of police or the board or officer having control of the police
108 in a city or town.

109 “School resource officer”, a duly sworn municipal police officer with all necessary
110 training, up-to-date certificates or a special officer appointed by the chief of police charged with
111 providing law enforcement and security services to elementary and secondary public schools.
112 For the purpose of this section a school resource officer shall be exempt from subsection (j) of
113 section 10 of chapter 269, while serving in the officer’s official capacity.

114 (b) Every chief of police, in consultation with the superintendent and subject to
115 appropriation, shall assign at least 1 school resource officer to serve the city, town, regional
116 school district or county agricultural school. In the case of a regional school district, a
117 commonwealth charter school or county agriculture school, the chief of police of the city or town
118 where the school is located, in consultation with the superintendent, shall assign the school
119 resource officer, which may be the same officer for all schools in the city or town.

120 In assigning a school resource officer, the chief of police shall consider candidates that
121 the chief believes would strive to foster an optimal learning environment and educational
122 community; provided, however, that the chief of police shall give preference to candidates who
123 have received specialized training in child and adolescent development, de-escalation and
124 conflict resolution techniques with children and adolescents, behavioral health disorders in
125 children and adolescents, alternatives to arrest and other juvenile justice diversion strategies and
126 behavioral threat assessment methods. The assignment shall not be based solely on seniority. The
127 performance of school resource officers shall be reviewed annually by the superintendent and the
128 chief of police. There shall be placed on file in the office of the superintendent and the chief of
129 police a memorandum of understanding clearly defining the role and duties of the school
130 resource officer.

131 (c) Upon written application by a school department, in consultation with the chief of
132 police, of a city or town, a regional school district or a county agricultural school, the
133 commissioner of elementary and secondary education may waive the requirements of this section
134 if the secretary believes a school resource officer would not assist that particular city or town,

135 regional school district or county agricultural school to ensure school safety. The written
136 application shall include: (i) the reasons for the waiver request; (ii) data or evidence supporting
137 the waiver request; and (iii) a description of, and supporting data for, alternative procedures and
138 resources relied upon to ensure safe schools.

139 (d) The department of elementary and secondary education shall promulgate rules or
140 regulations necessary to carry out this section.

141 (e) Notwithstanding subsection (b), if the chief of police, in consultation with the
142 superintendent, determines that there are not sufficient resources to assign a school resource
143 officer to serve the city, town, regional school district or county agricultural school, the chief of
144 police shall consult with the department of state police to ensure that a school resource officer is
145 assigned, subject to appropriation; provided further, that if a state police officer is assigned to a
146 city, town, regional school district or county agricultural school, assignment shall not be based
147 solely on seniority and a candidate shall be considered who would strive to foster an optimal
148 learning environment and educational community; provided further, that there shall be placed on
149 file in the office of the superintendent and the department of state police a memorandum of
150 understanding clearly defining the roles and duties of the school resource officer.

151 (f) No public employer shall be liable for injury, loss of property, personal injury or death
152 caused by an act or omission of a public employee while acting in the scope of the public
153 employee's employment and arising out of the implementation of this section. This section shall
154 not be construed as creating or imposing a specific duty of care.

155 Section 37Q. (a) As used in this section the following words shall have the following
156 meanings, unless the context clearly requires otherwise:-

157 "Approved private day or residential school", a school that accepts, through agreement
158 with a school committee, a child requiring special education pursuant to section 10 of chapter
159 71B.

160 "Charter school", commonwealth charter schools and Horace Mann charter schools
161 established pursuant to section 89.

162 "Collaborative school", a school operated by an educational collaborative established
163 pursuant to section 4E of chapter 40.

164 "Plan", a mental health support plan established pursuant to subsection (b).

165 "School district", the school department of a city or town, a regional school district or a
166 county agricultural school.

167 (b) Each school district, charter school, approved private day or residential school and
168 collaborative school shall develop and adhere to a plan to address the general mental health

169 needs of its students, including the students' families, teachers and school administrators. Each
170 plan shall also address the potential need for emergency and acute treatment for students,
171 including the students' families, teachers and school administrators, as a result of a tragedy or
172 crisis within the district or school. Before September 1 of each year, each school district, charter
173 school, approved private day or residential school and collaborative school shall review and
174 update its plan to achieve best practices.

175 (c) The department of elementary and secondary education shall promulgate rules or
176 regulations necessary to carry out this section.

177 (d) No public employer shall be liable for injury, loss of property, personal injury or
178 death caused by an act or omission of a public employee while acting in the scope of the public
179 employee's employment and arising out of the implementation of this section. This section shall
180 not be construed as creating or imposing a specific duty of care.

181 Section 37R. (a) As used in this section the following words shall have the following
182 meanings, unless the context clearly requires otherwise:-

183 "School", a school administered by a school department of a city or town or regional
184 school district, a county agricultural school, a commonwealth charter school or Horace Mann
185 charter school established pursuant to section 89 or an educational collaborative established
186 pursuant to section 4E of chapter 40.

187 "Two-way communication device", a device capable of transmitting, conveying or
188 routing real-time, 2-way voice communications through radio frequency.

189 (b) Every school shall, subject to appropriation, possess and have access to a two-way
190 communication device to be used solely for communicating with police and fire departments of
191 the city or town where the school is located during an emergency situation.

192 (c) No public employer shall be liable for injury, loss of property, personal injury or
193 death caused by an act or omission of a public employee while acting in the scope of the public
194 employee's employment and arising out of the implementation of this section. This section shall
195 not be construed as creating or imposing a specific duty of care.

196 SECTION 11. Said chapter 71 is hereby further amended by adding the following
197 section:-

198 Section 95. (a) The department, subject to appropriation, shall adopt rules to require that
199 all public school districts provide at least 2 hours of suicide awareness and prevention training
200 every 3 years to all licensed school personnel. A new hire shall obtain the training within 1 year
201 of being hired. The training shall be provided within the framework of existing in-service
202 training programs offered by the department or as part of required professional development
203 activities.

204 (b) The department shall, in consultation with the department of public health and suicide
205 prevention experts, develop a list of approved training materials to fulfill the requirements of this
206 section. Approved materials shall include training on how to identify appropriate mental health
207 services, both within the school and the larger community, and when and how to refer students
208 and their families to those services.

209 (c) No person shall have a cause of action for loss or damage caused by an act or
210 omission resulting from the implementation of this section or resulting from the training or lack
211 of training required by this section.

212 (d) The training or lack of training required by this section shall not be construed to
213 impose a specific duty of care.

214 SECTION 12. Chapter 111 of the General Laws is hereby amended by adding the
215 following 2 sections:-

216 Section 232. The department of public health, in consultation with the executive office of
217 public safety and security, shall, subject to appropriation, collect, record and analyze data on all
218 suicides in the commonwealth. Data collected for each incident shall include, to the extent
219 possible and with respect to all applicable privacy protection laws, the following: (i) the means
220 of the suicide; (ii) the source of the means of the suicide; (iii) the length of time between
221 purchase of the means and the death of the decedent; (iv) the relationship of the owner of the
222 means to the decedent; (v) whether the means was legally obtained and owned pursuant to the
223 laws of the commonwealth; (vi) a record of past suicide attempts by the decedent; and (vii) a
224 record of past mental health treatment of the decedent.

225 The department shall annually submit a report, which shall include aggregate data
226 collected for the preceding calendar year and the department's analysis, with the clerks of the
227 house of representatives and the senate and the executive office of public safety and security not
228 later than December 31. Names, addresses or other identifying factors shall not be included.

229 The commissioner shall work in conjunction with the offices and agencies in custody of
230 the data listed in this section to facilitate collection of the data and to ensure that data sharing
231 mechanisms are in compliance with all applicable laws relating to privacy protection.

232 Data collected and held by the department to complete the report pursuant to this section
233 shall not be subject to section 10 of chapter 66 and clause Twenty-sixth of section 7 of chapter 4.

234 Section 233. The department shall direct the division of violence and injury prevention to
235 develop educational materials on harm reduction, which shall be discussed and distributed by the
236 instructor to every participant in a hunter education course as provided in section 14 of chapter
237 131 and to every participant in a basic firearms safety course as provided in section 131P of
238 chapter 140.

239 The educational materials shall promote suicide prevention through safe practices by
240 firearms owners to reduce access to lethal means. The materials shall include, but shall not be
241 limited to, information on: (i) the prevalence of firearms suicide as compared to other forms of
242 firearms violence, including demographic trends; (ii) the risks of injury and suicide that may be
243 associated with household firearms, including the rate of survival for suicide attempts by firearm
244 as compared to other means of attempted suicide; (iii) best practices for identifying and reducing
245 the risk of suicide involving household firearms; (iv) available resources to learn more about safe
246 practices and suicide prevention; and (v) additional information determined by the commissioner
247 to be relevant for these purposes.

248 The department shall further direct the division to develop a notice providing information
249 on suicide prevention, which shall be available on the website of the department and shall be
250 posted and distributed pursuant to clause Fourteenth of section 123 of said chapter 140. The
251 notice shall include, but not be limited to, information on signs and symptoms of depression, the
252 state and federal suicide prevention hotlines and resources for a person at risk of suicide.

253 SECTION 13. Chapter 112 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
254 section 5M the following section:-

255 Section 5N. The board of registration in medicine established pursuant to section 5B
256 shall, in collaboration with experts in violence and injury prevention, and in coordination with
257 relevant training accreditation bodies, develop or provide for, and make available for voluntary
258 participation by a physician, a professional development training module on suicide prevention
259 through reduction of access to lethal means. The goal of the training module shall be to
260 encourage physicians to speak with their patients and patients' families about the risk posed by
261 access to lethal means in the home and to increase a physician's ability and comfort in having
262 such discussions with patients and families in a legally, ethically and medically appropriate
263 manner. The training module shall include information on:

264 (i) rates of attempted and completed suicides, including demographics, trends in mental
265 health histories of suicide victims and trends in rates of reattempts by survivors;

266 (ii) the impact of lethal means reduction in reducing rates of completed suicides and on
267 best practices, separate and distinct from behavioral health treatment, that may impact suicide
268 rates through the reduction of environmental safety risks;

269 (iii) the role of firearms, including firearms ownership and access to household firearms,
270 in impacting rates of attempted and completed suicides;

271 (iv) strategies for discussions with patients, the patient's family or legal guardians
272 concerning safety assessments and securing or removing firearms and other lethal means of
273 suicide from the home during high risk periods; and

274 (v) other appropriate and relevant information, as determined by the board, for the
275 purpose of the training.

276 The training module developed shall be accepted by the board as up to 2 continuing
277 professional development credits.

278 SECTION 13A. Section 121 of chapter 140, as appearing in the 2012 Official Edition, is
279 hereby amended by inserting after the definition of “Conviction” the following definition:-

280 “Deceptive weapon device”, any device or item used in the commission of a violent
281 crime that is intended to convey the presence of a weapon to a potential victim or law
282 enforcement officer; provided, however, that a deceptive weapon device shall include, but shall
283 not limited to, a common air gun, toy gun or substance carved or fashioned to resemble a
284 weapon.

285 SECTION 14. Section 35 of chapter 123 of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
286 amended by adding the following 4 paragraphs:-

287 The court, in its order, shall specify whether such commitment is based upon a finding
288 that the person is a person with an alcohol use disorder, substance use disorder, or both. The
289 court, upon ordering the commitment of a person found to be a person with an alcohol use
290 disorder or substance use disorder pursuant to this section, shall transmit the person's name and
291 nonclinical identifying information, including the person's social security number and date of
292 birth, to the department of criminal justice information services. The court shall notify the person
293 that such person is prohibited from being issued a firearm identification card pursuant to section
294 129B of chapter 140 or a license to carry pursuant to sections 131 and 131F of said chapter 140
295 unless a petition for relief pursuant to this section is subsequently granted.

296 After 5 years from the date of commitment, a person found to be a person with an alcohol
297 use disorder or substance use disorder and committed pursuant to this section may file a petition
298 for relief with the court that ordered the commitment requesting that the court restore the
299 person's ability to possess a firearm, rifle or shotgun. When such a petition is filed, the court
300 shall notify the chief of police in the city or town where the person resides. The court may grant
301 the relief sought in accordance with the principles of due process if the circumstances regarding
302 the person's disqualifying condition and the person's record and reputation are determined to be
303 such that: (i) the person is not likely to act in a manner that is dangerous to public safety; and (ii)
304 the granting of relief would not be contrary to the public interest. In making the determination,
305 the court shall consider relevant information provided by the chief of police in the city or town
306 where the person resides and may consider evidence from a licensed physician or clinical
307 psychologist that the person is no longer suffering from the disease or condition that caused the
308 disability or that the disease or condition has been successfully treated for a period of 3
309 consecutive years.

310 If the court grants a petition for relief pursuant to this section, the clerk shall provide
311 notice immediately by forwarding a certified copy of the order for relief to the department of
312 criminal justice information services, who shall transmit the order, pursuant to paragraph (h) of
313 section 167A of chapter 6, to the attorney general of the United States to be included in the
314 National Instant Criminal Background Check System.

315 A person whose petition for relief is denied may appeal to the appellate division of the
316 district court for a de novo review of the denial.

317 SECTION 15. Section 36A of said chapter 123, as so appearing, is hereby amended by
318 adding the following paragraph:-

319 Notwithstanding this section, a court may, pursuant to section 35 and section 36C,
320 transmit information contained in court records to the department of criminal justice information
321 services to provide: (i) licensing authorities as defined under section 121 of chapter 140 with
322 information required or permitted to be considered under state or federal law to conduct
323 background checks for firearm sales or licensing; and (ii) the attorney general of the United
324 States with information required or permitted under federal law to be included in the National
325 Instant Criminal Background Check System maintained to conduct background checks for
326 firearms sales or licensing; provided, however, that the court shall not transmit information
327 solely because a person seeks voluntary treatment or is involuntarily hospitalized for assessment
328 or evaluation. Information transmitted to the department of criminal justice information services
329 pursuant to this section and sections 35 and 36C shall not be considered public records pursuant
330 to section 10 of chapter 66 and clause Twenty-sixth of section 7 of chapter 4.

331 SECTION 16. Said chapter 123 is hereby further amended by adding the following
332 section:-

333 Section 36C. (a) A court that orders the commitment of a person pursuant to sections 7, 8
334 or 18 or subsection (e) of section 12 or subsection (b) of section 15 or subsection (b) or (c) of
335 section 16, shall transmit the person's name and nonclinical, identifying information, including
336 the person's social security number and date of birth, to the department of criminal justice
337 information services. The court shall notify the person that such person is prohibited from being
338 issued a firearm identification card pursuant to section 129B of chapter 140 or a license to carry
339 pursuant to sections 131 and 131F of said chapter 140 unless a petition for relief is subsequently
340 granted pursuant to subsection (b).

341 (b) After 5 years from the date of commitment, a person committed pursuant to sections
342 7, 8 or 18 or subsection (e) of section 12 or subsection (b) of section 15 or subsection (b) or (c)
343 of section 16 may file a petition for relief with the court that ordered the commitment requesting
344 the court to restore the person's ability to possess a firearm. The court may grant the relief sought
345 in accordance with the principles of due process if the circumstances regarding the person's
346 disqualifying condition and the person's record and reputation are determined to be such that: (i)

347 the person is not likely to act in a manner that is dangerous to public safety; and (ii) the granting
348 of relief would not be contrary to the public interest. In making the determination, the court shall
349 consider relevant information provided by the chief of police in the city or town where the
350 person resides and may consider evidence from a licensed physician or clinical psychologist that
351 the person is no longer suffering from the disease or condition that caused the disability or that
352 the disease or condition has been successfully treated for a period of 3 consecutive years.

353 (c) When the court grants a petition for relief pursuant to subsection (b), the clerk shall
354 immediately forward a copy of the order for relief to the department of criminal justice
355 information services.

356 (d) A person whose petition for relief is denied pursuant to subsection (b) may appeal to
357 the appellate division of the district court for a de novo review of the denial.

358 SECTION 17. The first paragraph of section 14 of chapter 131 of the General Laws, as
359 appearing in the 2012 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting after the second sentence
360 the following sentence:- The course shall also include, with respect to the safe handling of
361 firearms, the program of instruction on harm reduction developed by the division on violence
362 and injury prevention within the department of public health.

363 SECTION 18. Section 121 of chapter 140 of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
364 amended by striking out, in line 1, the figure "131P" and inserting in place thereof the following
365 figure:- 131Q.

366 SECTION 19. Said section 121 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
367 amended by striking out, in lines 6 to 8, inclusive, the words "chemical mace or any device or
368 instrument which contains or emits a liquid, gas, powder or any other substance designed to
369 incapacitate".

370 SECTION 20. Said chapter 140 of the General Laws is hereby further amended by
371 inserting after section 122B the following 2 sections:-

372 Section 122C. (a) As used in this section and section 122D, "self-defense spray" shall
373 mean chemical mace, pepper spray or any device or instrument which contains, propels or emits
374 a liquid, gas, powder or other substance designed to incapacitate.

375 (b) Whoever, not being licensed as provided in section 122B, sells self-defense spray
376 shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment in a
377 house of correction for not less than 6 months nor more than 2 years.

378 (c) Whoever sells self-defense spray to a person younger than 18 years of age, if the
379 person younger than 18 years of age does not have a firearms identification card, shall be
380 punished by a fine of not more than \$300.

381 (d) A person under 18 years of age who possesses self-defense spray and who does not
382 have a firearms identification card shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$300.

383 Section 122D. No person shall purchase or possess self-defense spray who:

384 (i) in a court of the commonwealth, has been convicted or adjudicated a youthful offender
385 or delinquent child as defined in section 52 of chapter 119 for the commission of: (A) a felony;
386 (B) a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for more than 2 years; (C) a violent crime as
387 defined in section 121; (D) a violation of a law regulating the use, possession, ownership,
388 transfer, purchase, sale, lease, rental, receipt or transportation of weapons or ammunition for
389 which a term of imprisonment may be imposed; or (E) a violation of a law regulating the use,
390 possession or sale of a controlled substance as defined in section 1 of chapter 94C including, but
391 not limited to, a violation under said chapter 94C; provided, however, that except for the
392 commission of a violent crime or a crime involving the trafficking of controlled substances, if the
393 person has been so convicted or adjudicated or released from confinement, probation or parole
394 supervision for such conviction or adjudication, whichever occurs last, for 5 or more years
395 immediately preceding the purchase or possession, that person may purchase or possess self-
396 defense spray;

397 (ii) in another state or federal jurisdiction, has been convicted or adjudicated a youthful
398 offender or delinquent child for the commission of: (A) a felony; (B) a misdemeanor punishable
399 by imprisonment for more than 2 years; (C) a violent crime as defined in section 121; (D) a
400 violation of a law regulating the use, possession, ownership, transfer, purchase, sale, lease,
401 rental, receipt or transportation of weapons or ammunition for which a term of imprisonment
402 may be imposed; or (E) a violation of a law regulating the use, possession or sale of a controlled
403 substance as defined in section 1 of chapter 94C; provided, however, that, except for the
404 commission of a violent crime or a crime involving the trafficking of weapons or controlled
405 substances, if the person has been so convicted or adjudicated or released from confinement,
406 probation or parole supervision for such conviction or adjudication, whichever occurs last, for 5
407 or more years immediately preceding the purchase or possession and that applicant's right or
408 ability to possess a rifle or shotgun has been fully restored in the jurisdiction wherein the subject
409 conviction or adjudication was entered, then that person may purchase or possess self-defense
410 spray;

411 (iii) has been committed to any hospital or institution for mental illness unless the person
412 obtains, prior to purchase or possession, an affidavit of a licensed physician or clinical
413 psychologist attesting that such physician or psychologist is familiar with the applicant's mental
414 illness and that in the physician's or psychologist's opinion the applicant is not disabled by such
415 an illness in a manner that shall prevent the applicant from possessing self-defense spray;

416 (iv) is or has been in recovery from or committed based upon a finding that the person is
417 a person with an alcohol use disorder or a substance use disorder or both unless a licensed

418 physician or clinical psychologist deems such person to be in recovery from such condition, in
419 which case, such person may purchase or possess self-defense spray after 5 years from the date
420 of such confinement or recovery; provided, however, that prior to such purchase or possession of
421 self-defense spray, the applicant shall submit an affidavit issued by a licensed physician or
422 clinical psychologist attesting that such physician or psychologist knows the person's history of
423 treatment and that in that physician's or psychologist's opinion the applicant is in recovery;

424 (v) at the time of the application, is younger than 15 years of age;

425 (vi) at the time of the application, is at least 15 years of age but less than 18 years of age
426 unless the applicant submits with the application a certificate from the applicant's parent or
427 guardian granting the applicant permission to apply for a card;

428 (vii) is an alien who does not maintain lawful permanent residency or is an alien not
429 residing under a visa pursuant to 8 U.S.C § 1101(a)(15)(U), or is an alien not residing under a
430 visa pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1154(a)(1)(B)(ii)(I) or is an alien not residing under a visa pursuant
431 to 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(15)(T)(i)(I)-(IV);

432 (viii) is currently subject to: (1) an order for suspension or surrender issued pursuant to
433 section 3B or 3C of chapter 209A or section 7 of chapter 258E; or (2) a permanent or temporary
434 protection order issued pursuant to chapter 209A or section 7 of chapter 258E; or

435 (ix) is currently the subject of an outstanding arrest warrant in any state or federal
436 jurisdiction.

437 Whoever purchases or possesses self-defense spray in violation of this section shall be
438 punished by a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment in a house of
439 correction for not less than 6 months nor more than 2 years or both such fine and imprisonment.

440 SECTION 21. Section 123 of said chapter 140, as appearing in the 2012 Official Edition,
441 is hereby amended by striking out, in lines 37 and 59, the words "Class A", each time they
442 appear.

443 SECTION 22. Said section 123 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
444 amended by striking out, in lines 40 and 63, the words "Class A or Class B", each time they
445 appear.

446 SECTION 23. Said section 123 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
447 amended by inserting after the word "height", in line 127, the following words:- , and further that
448 the licensee shall conspicuously post and distribute at each purchase counter a notice providing
449 information on suicide prevention developed and provided by the division on violence and injury
450 prevention within the department of public health. The department of public health shall develop
451 and make available on its website for download a sign providing the information on suicide
452 prevention.

453 SECTION 24. Said section 123 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further

456 Clauses Eighteenth to Twenty-first, inclusive, of the first paragraph shall not apply to: (i)

508 ammunition for which a term of imprisonment may be imposed; (E) a violation of a law

511 crime of domestic violence as defined in 18 U.S.C. 921(a)(33); provided, however, that, except

520 offender or delinquent child for the commission of: (a) a felony; (b) a misdemeanor punishable
521 by imprisonment for more than 2 years; (c) a violent crime as defined in section 121; (d) a
522 violation of a law regulating the use, possession, ownership, transfer, purchase, sale, lease,
523 rental, receipt or transportation of weapons or ammunition for which a term of imprisonment
524 may be imposed; (e) a violation of a law regulating the use, possession or sale of controlled
525 substances, as defined in section 1 of chapter 94C, including, but not limited to, a violation under
526 said chapter 94C; or (f) a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence as defined in 18 U.S.C.
527 921(a)(33); provided, however, that, except for the commission of felony, a misdemeanor crime
528 of domestic violence, a violent crime or a crime involving the trafficking of weapons or

529 controlled substances, if the applicant has been so convicted or adjudicated or released from
530 confinement, probation or parole supervision for such conviction or adjudication, whichever
531 occurs last, for 5 or more years immediately preceding such application and the applicant's right
532 or ability to possess a rifle or shotgun has been fully restored in the jurisdiction wherein the
533 conviction or adjudication was entered, then the conviction or adjudication shall not disqualify
534 such applicant for a firearm identification card;

535 (iii) is or has been: (1) except in the case of a commitment pursuant to sections 35 or 36C
536 of chapter 123, committed to a hospital or institution for mental illness, alcohol or substance
537 abuse, unless after 5 years from the date of the confinement, the applicant submits with the
538 application an affidavit of a licensed physician or clinical psychologist attesting that such
539 physician or psychologist is familiar with the applicant's mental illness, alcohol or substance
540 abuse and that in the physician's or psychologist's opinion the applicant is not disabled by a
541 mental illness, alcohol or substance abuse in a manner that should prevent the applicant from
542 possessing a firearm, rifle or shotgun; (2) committed by an order of a court to a hospital or
543 institution for mental illness, unless the applicant was granted a petition for relief of the court's
544 order pursuant to section 36C of chapter 123 and submits a copy of the order for relief with the
545 application; (3) subject to an order of the probate court appointing a guardian or conservator for a
546 incapacitated person on the grounds that that applicant lacks the mental capacity to contract or
547 manage affairs, unless the applicant was granted a petition for relief pursuant to section 56C of
548 chapter 215 and submits a copy of the order for relief with the application; or (4) found to be a
549 person with an alcohol use disorder or substance use disorder or both and committed pursuant to
550 section 35 of said chapter 123, unless the applicant was granted a petition for relief of the court's
551 order pursuant to said section 35 of said chapter 123 and submits a copy of the order for relief
552 with the application;

553 (iv) is at the time of the application younger than 14 years of age; provided, however, that
554 the card shall not be issued until the applicant reaches the age of 15;

555 (v) is at the time of the application more than 14 but less than 18 years of age, unless the
556 applicant submits with the application a certificate of a parent or guardian granting the applicant
557 permission to apply for a card;

558 (vi) is an alien who does not maintain lawful permanent residency;

559 (vii) is currently subject to: (A) an order for suspension or surrender issued pursuant to
560 section 3B or 3C of chapter 209A or a similar order issued by another jurisdiction; or (B) a
561 permanent or temporary protection order issued pursuant to chapter 209A, a similar order issued
562 by another jurisdiction, including an order described in 18 U.S.C. 922(g)(8);

563 (viii) is currently the subject of an outstanding arrest warrant in any state or federal
564 jurisdiction;

565 (ix) has been discharged from the armed forces of the United States under dishonorable
566 conditions;

567 (x) is a fugitive from justice; or

568 (xi) having been a citizen of the United States, has renounced that citizenship.

569 SECTION 29. Paragraph (2) of said section 129B of said chapter 140, as so appearing,
570 is hereby amended by adding the following 2 sentences:- The licensing authority shall provide to
571 the applicant a receipt indicating that it received the applicant's application. The receipt shall be
572 provided to the applicant within 7 days by mail if the application was received by mail or
573 immediately if the application was made in person; provided, however, that the receipt shall
574 include the applicants' name, address, current firearm identification card number, if any, the
575 current card's expiration date, if any, the date when the application was received by the licensing

620 for all lawful purposes, until the application for renewal is approved or denied; provided,
621 however, if the cardholder is on active duty with the armed forces of the United States on the

624 cardholder applied for renewal prior to the end of such period, the card shall remain valid after

650 SECTION 36A. Said section 129B of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
651 amended by striking out, in line 248, the figure “\$500” and inserting in place thereof the
652 following figure:- \$100.

653 SECTION 37. The third paragraph of section 129C of said chapter 140, as so appearing,
654 is hereby amended by striking out the last sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 2
655 sentences:- Whoever fails to report the loss or theft of a firearm, rifle, shotgun or machine gun
656 or the recovery of a firearm, rifle, shotgun or machine gun previously reported lost or stolen to
657 the commissioner of the department of criminal justice information services and the licensing
658 authority in the city or town where the owner resides shall be punished by a fine of not less than
659 \$500 nor more than \$1,000 for a first offense, by a fine of not less than \$2,500 nor more than
660 \$7,500 for a second offense and by a fine of not less than \$7,500 nor more than \$10,000 or
661 imprisonment for not less than 1 year nor more than 5 years, or by both such fine and
662 imprisonment, for a third or subsequent offense. Failure to so report shall be a cause for

668 however, that persons reporting loss or theft under this paragraph or under section 129B on a
669 second or subsequent occasion may be subject to suspension, revocation or be considered
670 unsuitable under said section 131 for the renewal of a lawfully held firearm identification card or
671 license to carry firearms.

675 Nothing in this section shall permit the sale or transfer of a large capacity rifle, shotgun
676 or firearm or large capacity feeding device therefor to a person not in possession of a license to
677 carry firearms issued pursuant to section 131.

678 SECTION 39. Section 129D of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby amended by
679 striking out the first paragraph and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:-

680 Upon revocation, suspension or denial of an application for a firearm identification card
681 pursuant to section 129B or for any firearms license if the firearm identification card is not then
682 in force or for any machine gun license, the person whose application was so revoked, suspended
683 or denied shall without delay deliver or surrender to the licensing authority where the person
684 resides all firearms, rifles, shotguns and machine guns and ammunition which the person then
685 possesses unless an appeal of the revocation or suspension is pending. The person or the
686 person's legal representative shall have the right, at any time up to 1 year after the delivery or
687 surrender, to transfer the firearms, rifles, shotguns and machine guns and ammunition to any
688 licensed dealer or any other person legally permitted to purchase or take possession of the
689 firearms, rifles, shotguns and machine guns and ammunition and, upon notification in writing by
690 the purchaser or transferee and the former owner, the licensing authority shall within 10 days
691 deliver the firearms, rifles, shotguns and machine guns and ammunition to the transferee or
692 purchaser and the licensing authority shall observe due care in the receipt and holding of any
693 such firearm, rifle, shotgun or machine gun and ammunition; provided, however, that the
694 purchaser or transferee shall affirm in writing that the purchaser or transferee shall not in
695 violation of section 129C transfer the firearms, rifles, shotguns or machine guns or ammunition
696 to the former owner. The licensing authority shall at the time of delivery or surrender inform the
697 person in writing of the authority's ability, within 1 year after delivery or surrender, to transfer
698 the firearms, rifles, shotguns and machine guns and ammunition to any licensed dealer or other
699 person legally permitted to purchase or take possession.

702 firearm, rifle, shotgun or machine gun or ammunition classified as having been used to carry out

704 SECTION 41. Said section 129D of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
705 amended by inserting after the third paragraph the following paragraph:-

706 If the licensing authority cannot reasonably ascertain a lawful owner within 180 days of
707 acquisition by the authority, the authority may, in its discretion, trade or dispose of surplus,
708 donated, abandoned or junk firearms, rifles, shotguns or machine guns or ammunition to properly
709 licensed distributors or firearms dealers. The proceeds of the sale or transfer shall be remitted or
710 credited to the municipality in which the authority presides to purchase weapons, equipment or
711 supplies or for violence reduction or suicide prevention; provided, however, that no firearm,

712 rifle, shotgun or machine gun or ammunition classified as having been used to carry out a
713 criminal act pursuant to section 131Q shall be considered surplus, donated, abandoned or junk
714 for the purposes of this section.

715 SECTION 42. Said chapter 140 is hereby further amended by striking out section 130
716 and inserting in place thereof the following 2 sections:-

717 Section 130. Whoever sells or furnishes a rifle, shotgun or ammunition to an alien 18
718 years of age or older who does not hold a permit card issued to that alien pursuant to section
719 131H or, except as provided in this section or section 131E, whoever sells or furnishes an alien
720 or a person under 18 years of age a rifle, shotgun, machine gun or ammunition, or whoever sells
721 or furnishes to a person under 21 years of age a firearm or large capacity rifle or shotgun or
722 ammunition therefor shall have the license to sell firearms, rifles, shotguns, machine guns or
723 ammunition revoked and shall not be entitled to apply for such license for 10 years from the date
724 of such revocation and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$10,000,
725 or by imprisonment in a state prison for not more than 10 years or by imprisonment in a house of
726 correction for not more than 2½ years or by both such fine and imprisonment.

727 Section 130½. Notwithstanding section 130 or any general or special law to the contrary,
728 it shall be lawful to furnish a weapon to a minor for hunting, recreation, instruction and
729 participation in shooting sports while under the supervision of a holder of a valid firearm
730 identification card or license to carry appropriate for the weapon in use; provided, however, that
731 the parent or guardian of the minor granted consent for such activities.

732 SECTION 43. Section 131 of said chapter 140, as appearing in the 2012 Official Edition,
733 is hereby amended by striking out, in lines 1 and 2, the words "All licenses to carry firearms
734 shall be designated Class A or Class B, and the issuance and possession of any such license" and
735 inserting in place thereof the following words:- The issuance and possession of a license to carry
736 firearms.

737 SECTION 44. Said section 131 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
738 amended by striking out paragraphs (a) to (c), inclusive, and inserting in place thereof the
739 following 3 paragraphs:-

740 (a) A license shall entitle a holder of a license to purchase, rent, lease, borrow, possess
741 and carry: (i) firearms, including large capacity firearms, and feeding devices and ammunition
742 therefor, for all lawful purposes, subject to such restrictions relative to the possession, use or
743 carrying of firearms as the licensing authority considers proper; and (ii) rifles and shotguns,
744 including large capacity weapons and feeding devices and ammunition therefor, for all lawful
745 purposes; provided, however, that the licensing authority may impose such restrictions relative to
746 the possession, use or carrying of large capacity rifles and shotguns as it considers proper. A
747 violation of a restriction imposed by the licensing authority under this paragraph shall be cause
748 for suspension or revocation and shall, unless otherwise provided, be punished by a fine of not

749 less than \$1,000 nor more than \$10,000; provided, however, that section 10 of chapter 269 shall
750 not apply to a violation of this paragraph.

751 (b) The colonel of state police may, after an investigation, grant a license to a club or
752 facility with an on-site shooting range or gallery, which club is incorporated under the laws of
753 the commonwealth for the possession, storage and use of large capacity weapons, ammunition
754 therefor and large capacity feeding devices for use with such weapons on the premises of the
755 club; provided, however, that not less than 1 shareholder of the club shall be qualified and
756 suitable to be issued a license; and provided further, that such large capacity weapons and
757 ammunition feeding devices may be used under the club license only by a member that possesses
758 a valid firearm identification card issued pursuant to section 129B or a valid license to carry
759 firearms or by such other person that the club permits while under the direct supervision of a
760 certified firearms safety instructor or club member who, in the case of a large capacity firearm,
761 possesses a valid license to carry firearms or, in the case of a large capacity rifle or shotgun,
762 possesses a valid license to carry firearms. The club shall not permit shooting at targets that
763 depict human figures, human effigies, human silhouettes or any human images thereof, except by
764 public safety personnel performing in line with their official duties.

765 No large capacity weapon or large capacity feeding device shall be removed from the
766 premises except to: (i) transfer the firearm or feeding device to a licensed dealer; (ii) transport
767 the firearm or feeding device to a licensed gunsmith for repair; (iii) target, trap or skeet shoot on
768 the premises of another club incorporated under the laws of the commonwealth and to transport
769 thereto; (iv) attend an exhibition or educational project or event that is sponsored by, conducted
770 under the supervision of or approved by a public law enforcement agency or a nationally or state
771 recognized entity that promotes proficiency in or education about semiautomatic weapons and to
772 transport thereto and therefrom; (v) hunt pursuant to chapter 131; or (vi) surrender the firearm or
773 feeding device pursuant to section 129D. Any large capacity weapon or large capacity feeding
774 device kept on the premises of a lawfully incorporated shooting club shall, when not in use, be
775 secured in a locked container and shall be unloaded during any lawful transport. The clerk or
776 other corporate officer of the club shall annually file a report with the colonel of state police and
777 the commissioner of criminal justice information services listing all large capacity weapons and
778 large capacity feeding devices owned or possessed under the license. The colonel or a designee
779 may inspect all firearms owned or possessed by the club upon request during regular business
780 hours and the colonel may revoke or suspend a club license for a violation of this chapter or
781 chapter 269 relative to the ownership, use or possession of large capacity weapons or large
782 capacity feeding devices.

783 (c) A license to carry firearms shall be valid to own, possess, purchase and transfer non-
784 large capacity rifles and shotguns, consistent with the entitlements conferred by a firearm
785 identification card issued under section 129B.

786 SECTION 45. Said section 131 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
787 amended by striking out paragraph (d) and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:-

788 (d) Any person residing or having a place of business within the jurisdiction of the
789 licensing authority or any law enforcement officer employed by the licensing authority or any
790 person residing in an area of exclusive federal jurisdiction located within a city or town may
791 submit to the licensing authority or the colonel of state police, an application for a Class A
792 license to carry firearms, or renewal of the same, which the licensing authority or the colonel
793 may issue if it appears that the applicant is not a prohibited person, as set forth in this section, to
794 be issued a license and has good reason to fear injury to the applicant or the applicant's property
795 or for any other reason, including the carrying of firearms for use in sport or target practice only,
796 subject to the restrictions expressed or authorized under this section.

797 A prohibited person shall be a person who:

798 (i) has, in a court of the commonwealth, been convicted or adjudicated a youthful
799 offender or delinquent child, both as defined in section 52 of chapter 119, for the commission of
800 (A) a felony; (B) a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for more than 2 years ; (C) a
801 violent crime as defined in section 121; (D) a violation of any law regulating the use, possession,
802 ownership, transfer, purchase, sale, lease, rental, receipt or transportation of weapons or
803 ammunition for which a term of imprisonment may be imposed; (E) a violation of any law
804 regulating the use, possession or sale of a controlled substance as defined in section 1 of chapter
805 94C including, but not limited to, a violation of said chapter 94C; or (F) a misdemeanor crime of
806 domestic violence as defined in 18 U.S.C. 921(a)(33);

807 (ii) has, in any other state or federal jurisdiction, been convicted or adjudicated a youthful
808 offender or delinquent child for the commission of (A) a felony; (B) a misdemeanor punishable
809 by imprisonment for more than 2 years; (C) a violent crime as defined in section 121; (D) a
810 violation of any law regulating the use, possession, ownership, transfer, purchase, sale, lease,
811 rental, receipt or transportation of weapons or ammunition for which a term of imprisonment
812 may be imposed; (E) a violation of any law regulating the use, possession or sale of a controlled
813 substance as defined in said section 1 of said chapter 94C including, but not limited to, a
814 violation of said chapter 94C; or (F) a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence as defined in 18
815 U.S.C. 921(a)(33);

816 (iii) is or has been (A) committed to a hospital or institution for mental illness, alcohol or
817 substance abuse, except a commitment pursuant to sections 35 or 36C of chapter 123, unless
818 after 5 years from the date of the confinement the applicant submits with the application an
819 affidavit of a licensed physician or clinical psychologist attesting that such physician or
820 psychologist is familiar with the applicant's mental illness, alcohol or substance abuse and that in
821 the physician's or psychologist's opinion, the applicant is not disabled by a mental illness,
822 alcohol or substance abuse in a manner that shall prevent the applicant from possessing a

823 firearm, rifle or shotgun; (B) committed by a court order to a hospital or institution for mental
824 illness, unless the applicant was granted a petition for relief of the court order pursuant to said
825 section 36C of said chapter 123 and submits a copy of the court order with the application; (C)
826 subject to an order of the probate court appointing a guardian or conservator for a incapacitated
827 person on the grounds that the applicant lacks the mental capacity to contract or manage the
828 applicant's affairs, unless the applicant was granted a petition for relief of the order of the
829 probate court pursuant to section 56C of chapter 215 and submits a copy of the order of the
830 probate court with the application; or (D) found to be a person with an alcohol use disorder or
831 substance use disorder or both and committed pursuant to said section 35 of said chapter 123,
832 unless the applicant was granted a petition for relief of the court order pursuant to said section 35
833 and submits a copy of the court order with the application;

834 (iv) is younger than 21 years of age at the time of the application;

835 (v) is an alien who does not maintain lawful permanent residency;

836 (vi) is currently subject to (A) an order for suspension or surrender issued pursuant to
837 sections 3B or 3C of chapter 209A or a similar order issued by another jurisdiction; or (B) a
838 permanent or temporary protection order issued pursuant to said chapter 209A or a similar order
839 issued by another jurisdiction, including any order described in 18 U.S.C. 922(g)(8);

840 (vii) is currently the subject of an outstanding arrest warrant in any state or federal
841 jurisdiction;

842 (viii) has been discharged from the armed forces of the United States under dishonorable
843 conditions;

844 (ix) is a fugitive from justice; or

845 (x) having been a citizen of the United States, has renounced that citizenship.

846 The licensing authority may deny the application or renewal of a license to carry or
847 suspend or revoke a license issued under this section if, in a reasonable exercise of discretion, the
848 licensing authority determines that the applicant or licensee is unsuitable to be issued or to
849 continue to hold a license to carry. A determination of unsuitability shall be based on: (i) reliable
850 and credible information that the applicant or licensee has exhibited or engaged in behavior that
851 suggests that, if issued a license, the applicant or licensee may create a risk to the applicant or
852 licensee, to another person in the household of the applicant or licensee or to public safety; or (ii)
853 existing factors that suggest that, if issued a license, the applicant or licensee may create a risk to
854 the applicant or licensee, to another person in the household of the applicant or licensee or to
855 public safety. Upon denial of an application or renewal of a license based on a determination of
856 unsuitability, the licensing authority shall notify the applicant in writing setting forth the specific
857 reasons for the determination in accordance with paragraph (e). Upon revoking or suspending a

858 license based on a determination of unsuitability, the licensing authority shall notify the holder of
859 a license in writing setting forth the specific reasons for the determination in accordance with
860 paragraph (f). The determination of unsuitability shall be subject to judicial review under said
861 paragraph (f).

862 SECTION 46. Paragraph (d) of said section 131 of said chapter 140, as appearing in
863 section 45, is hereby further amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place
864 thereof the following sentence:- A person residing or having a place of business within the
865 jurisdiction of the licensing authority or any law enforcement officer employed by the licensing
866 authority or any person residing in an area of exclusive federal jurisdiction located within a city
867 or town may submit to the licensing authority or the colonel of state police an application for a
868 license to carry firearms, or renewal of the same, which the licensing authority or the colonel
869 may issue if it appears that the applicant is not a prohibited person as set forth in this section to
870 be issued a license and that the applicant has good reason to fear injury to the applicant or the
871 applicant's property or for any other reason, including the carrying of firearms for use in sport or
872 target practice only, subject to the restrictions expressed or authorized under this section.

873 SECTION 47. Paragraph (e) of said section 131 of said chapter 140, as appearing in the
874 2012 Official Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:-

875 The licensing authority shall provide to the applicant a receipt indicating that it received
876 the application. The receipt shall be provided to the applicant within 7 days by mail if the
877 application was received by mail or immediately if the application was made in person;
878 provided, however, that the receipt shall include the applicant's name and address; current
879 license number and license expiration date, if any; the date the licensing authority received the
880 application; the name, address and telephone number of the licensing authority; the agent of the
881 licensing authority that received the application; the type of application; and whether the
882 application is for a new license or a renewal of an existing license. The licensing
883 authority shall keep a copy of the receipt for not less than 1 year and shall furnish a copy to the
884 applicant if requested by the applicant.

888 Any applicant or holder aggrieved by a denial, revocation, suspension or restriction

890 within either 90 days after receiving notice of the denial, revocation or suspension or within 90
891 days after the expiration of the time limit during which the licensing authority shall respond to
892 the applicant or, in the case of a restriction, any time after a restriction is placed on the license
893 pursuant to this section, file a petition to obtain judicial review in the district court having
894 jurisdiction in the city or town in which the applicant filed the application or in which the license

895 was issued. If after a hearing a justice of the court finds that there was no reasonable ground for
896 denying, suspending, revoking or restricting the license and that the petitioner is not prohibited
897 by law from possessing a license, the justice may order a license to be issued or reinstated to the
898 petitioner or may order the licensing authority to remove certain restrictions placed on the
899 license.

900 SECTION 49. Paragraph (g) of said section 131 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is
901 hereby amended by striking out the first and second sentences and inserting in place thereof the
902 following 3 sentences:- A license shall be in a standard form provided by the commissioner of
903 criminal justice information services in a size and shape equivalent to that of a license to operate
904 motor vehicles issued by the registry of motor vehicles pursuant to section 8 of chapter 90 and
905 shall contain a license number which shall clearly indicate the name, address, photograph,
906 fingerprint, place and date of birth, height, weight, hair color, eye color and signature of the
907 licensee. The license shall be clearly marked "License to Carry Firearms". The license shall
908 provide in a legible font size and style the phone numbers for the National Suicide Prevention
909 Lifeline and the Samaritans Statewide Helpline.

910 SECTION 50. Paragraph (i) of said section 131 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is
911 hereby amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 3
912 sentences:- A license to carry or possess firearms shall be valid, unless revoked or suspended, for
913 a period of not more than 6 years from the date of issue and shall expire on the anniversary of the
914 licensee's date of birth occurring not less than 5 years nor more than 6 years from the date of
915 issue; provided, however, that, if the licensee applied for renewal before the license expired, the
916 license shall remain valid after its expiration date for all lawful purposes until the application for
917 renewal is approved or denied. If a licensee is on active duty with the armed forces of the United
918 States on the expiration date of the license, the license shall remain valid until the licensee is
919 released from active duty and for a period not less than 180 days following the release; provided,
920 however, that, if the licensee applied for renewal prior to the end of that period, the license shall
921 remain valid after its expiration date for all lawful purposes until the application for renewal is
922 approved or denied. An application for renewal of a Class B license filed before the license has
923 expired shall not extend the license beyond the stated expiration date; provided, that the Class B
924 license shall expire on the anniversary of the licensee's date of birth occurring not less than 5
925 years nor more than 6 years from the date of issue.

926 SECTION 51. Said paragraph (i) of said section 131 of said chapter 140 is hereby further

928 thereof the following 2 sentences:- A license to carry or possess firearms shall be valid, unless
929 revoked or suspended, for a period of not more than 6 years from the date of issue and shall
930 expire on the anniversary of the licensee's date of birth occurring not less than 5 years nor more
931 than 6 years from the date of issue; provided, however, that, if the licensee applied for renewal
932 before the license expired, the license shall remain valid after its expiration date for all lawful

934 with the armed forces of the United States on the expiration date of the license, the license shall
935 remain valid until the licensee is released from active duty and for a period not less than 180
936 days following the release; provided, however, that, if the licensee applied for renewal prior to
937 the end of that period, the license shall remain valid after its expiration date for all lawful
938 purposes until the application for renewal is approved or denied.

939 SECTION 52. Said section 131 of said chapter 140, as appearing in the 2012 Official
940 Edition, is hereby further amended by inserting after the word "For", in line 254, the following
941 words:- active and retired.

942 SECTION 53. Paragraph (l) of said section 131 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is
943 hereby amended by inserting after the first sentence the following sentence:- The form for
944 renewal shall include an affidavit in which the applicant shall verify that the applicant has not
945 lost any firearms or had any firearms stolen from the applicant's possession or has properly
946 reported the loss or theft of any firearm stolen from the applicant's possession since the date of
947 the applicant's last renewal or issuance.

948 SECTION 54. Said section 131 of said chapter 140, as so appearing, is hereby further
949 amended by striking out, in lines 317 to 320, inclusive, the words "meaning after 90 days beyond
950 the stated expiration date on the license, but who shall not be disqualified from renewal upon
951 application therefor under this section, shall be subject to a civil fine of not less than \$500" and
952 inserting in place thereof the following words:- not including licenses that remain valid under
953 paragraph (i) because the licensee applied for renewal before the license expired, but who shall
954 not be disqualified from renewal upon application therefor pursuant to this section, shall be
955 subject to a civil fine of not less than \$100.

956 SECTION 55. Said chapter 140 is hereby further amended by striking out section 131C
957 and inserting in place thereof the following section:-

958 Section 131C. (a) No person carrying a loaded firearm under a license issued pursuant to
959 section 131 or 131F shall carry the loaded firearm in a vehicle unless the loaded firearm while
960 carried in the vehicle is under the direct control of the person. Whoever violates this subsection
961 shall be punished by a fine of \$500.

962 (b) No person possessing a large capacity rifle or shotgun under a license issued pursuant
963 to section 131 or 131F shall possess the large capacity rifle or shotgun in a vehicle unless the
964 large capacity rifle or shotgun is unloaded and contained within the locked trunk of the vehicle or
965 in a locked case or other secure container. Whoever violates this subsection shall be punished by
966 a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$5,000.

967 (c) This section shall not apply to: (i) an officer, agent or employee of the
968 commonwealth, any state or the United States; (ii) a member of the military or other service of
969 any state or of the United States; (iii) a duly authorized law enforcement officer, agent or

982 qualified pursuant to section 128A or may purchase ammunition from a licensee under section
983 122B subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

984 (a) rifles, shotguns and feeding devices therefor may be so purchased only upon
985 presentment of: (i) a valid firearm identification card issued pursuant to section 129B; (ii) a valid
986 license to carry firearms issued pursuant to section 131; or (iii) valid proof of exempt status
987 under section 129C; provided, however, that large capacity rifles and shotguns and large capacity
988 feeding devices therefor may be so purchased only upon presentment of a license to carry
989 firearms issued pursuant to said section 131; and provided further, that no rifle, shotgun,
990 ammunition or ammunition feeding device therefor shall be sold to a person younger than 18
991 years of age; and provided further, that no large capacity rifle, shotgun or large capacity feeding
992 device therefor shall be sold to a person younger than 21 years of age; and

993 (b) firearms and feeding devices therefor, including large capacity firearms and large
994 capacity feeding devices therefor, may be so purchased only upon presentment of: (i) a valid
995 license to carry firearms issued pursuant to section 131; (ii) a valid firearm identification card
996 issued pursuant to section 129B; or (iii) valid proof of exempt status under section 129C;
997 provided, however, that neither a firearm identification card issued pursuant to said section 129B
998 nor proof of exempt status under said section 129C shall be valid to purchase a firearm or
999 ammunition feeding device therefor, including large capacity firearms and large capacity feeding
1000 devices therefor, without being presented together with a valid and proper permit to purchase
1001 issued under section 131A; and provided further, that an alien permit to possess a rifle or shotgun
1002 shall not be valid to purchase firearms, ammunition or ammunition feeding devices therefor; and
1003 provided further, that no firearm, ammunition or ammunition feeding device therefor shall be
1004 sold to a person younger than 21 years of age.

1005 A firearms collector, licensed pursuant to 18 U.S.C. 923(b), may purchase a rifle, shotgun
1006 or firearm that was not previously owned or registered in the commonwealth from a dealer

1007 licensed under section 122 if that rifle, shotgun or firearm is a curio or relic as defined in 27 CFR
1008 478.11.

1009 A person who uses a license to carry firearms or a firearm identification card to purchase
1010 a firearm, rifle or shotgun for the unlawful use of another or for resale to or giving to an
1011 unlicensed person shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$50,000 or
1012 by imprisonment for not less than 2½ years nor more than 10 years in a state prison or by both
1013 such fine and imprisonment. A conviction of a violation of this section shall be reported

1027 violation of any law regulating the use, possession, ownership, transfer, purchase, sale, lease,
1028 rental, receipt or transportation of weapons or ammunition for which a term of imprisonment
1029 may be imposed; (E) a violation of any law regulating the use, possession or sale of a
1030 controlled substance as defined in section 1 of chapter 94C; or (F) a misdemeanor crime of

1036 (v) is currently the subject of an outstanding arrest warrant in any state or federal
1037 jurisdiction;

1039 conditions;

1041 (viii) having been a citizen of the United States, has renounced that citizenship;

1042 (ix) not being a citizen or national of the United States, is illegally or unlawfully in the
1043 United States; or

1044 (x) not being a citizen or national of the United States, has been admitted to the United

1072 (d) A violation of this section shall be punished, in the case of a rifle or shotgun that is a
1073 large capacity weapon, firearm or machine gun that was stored or kept in a place where a person
1074 younger than 18 years of age may have access without committing an unforeseeable trespass, by
1075 a fine of not less than \$10,000 nor more than \$20,000 or by imprisonment for not less than 4
1076 years nor more than 15 years or by both such fine and imprisonment.

1395 sections 15 or 16 of chapter 123 of the General Laws;

1396 (v) found not guilty by reason of lack of mental responsibility pursuant to Article 50a of
1397 the Uniform Code of Military Justice, 10 U.S.C. § 850a; or

1398 (vi) found not guilty by reason of lack of mental capacity or mental responsibility
1399 pursuant to Article 76b of said Uniform Code of Military Justice, 10 U.S.C. § 876b.

1400 (b) Notwithstanding section 36 of chapter 123 of the General Laws and, to provide a
1401 licensing authority as defined in section 121 of chapter 140 of the General Laws with
1402 information required or permitted to be considered pursuant to state law to conduct background
1403 checks for firearms sales or licensing and to provide the attorney general of the United States
1404 with information required or permitted under federal law to be included in the National Instant
1405 Criminal Background Check System maintained to conduct background checks for firearms sales
1406 or licensing, the department of mental health shall, within 180 days of the effective date of this
1407 section, transmit to the department of criminal justice information services sufficient information
1408 to identify all persons known to the department to have been, within 20 years preceding the
1409 effective date of this section: (i) committed to psychiatric hospital, including commitments for
1410 mental illness pursuant to section 7, 8 or 18 or subsection (e) of section 12 or subsection (b) of
1411 section 15 or subsection (b) or (c) of section 16 of said chapter 123 of the General Laws or a
1412 commitment for substance abuse or alcoholism pursuant to section 35 of said chapter 123 of the
1413 General Laws; or (ii) determined by a court, board, commission or other lawful authority to pose
1414 a serious risk of harm.

1415 The department shall provide no more information than is necessary for the purpose
1416 stated above and the information shall not be considered a public record under clause Twenty-
1417 sixth of section 7 of chapter 4 of the General Laws.

1418 SECTION 98. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, a person
1419 licensed pursuant to section 122 of chapter 140 of the General Laws shall, within 180 days of the
1420 effective date of this section, obtain from the department of criminal justice information services
1421 all available criminal offender record information, as defined in section 167 of chapter 6 of the
1422 General Laws and authorized pursuant to clause (31) of subsection (a) of section 172 of said
1423 chapter 6, for current employees to determine the continued suitability of employees who may
1424 have direct and unmonitored contact with firearms, shotguns or rifles.

1425 SECTION 99. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, neither a
1426 licensing authority as defined in section 121 of chapter 140 of the General Laws nor the colonel
1427 of state police shall issue, renew or accept application for a Class B license to carry pursuant to
1428 sections 131 or 131F of said chapter 140 as of the effective date of this section; provided,
1429 however, that any Class B license issued pursuant to said sections 131 or 131F of said chapter
1430 140 prior to the effective date of this section shall remain in effect, subject to any restrictions or

1431 conditions set forth in any general or special law until the date on which the Class B license is set
1432 to expire or July 31, 2020, whichever occurs first; and provided further, that any application for
1433 renewal of a Class B license filed after the effective date of this section shall not extend the
1434 license beyond the stated expiration date pursuant to said section 131 of said chapter 140 and the
1435 Class B license shall expire on the anniversary of the licensee's date of birth occurring not less
1436 than 5 years but not more than 6 years from the date of issue or January 1, 2021, whichever
1437 occurs first.

1438 SECTION 100. The department of public health, in consultation with the center for
1439 health information and analysis, shall develop an implementation proposal and spending plan to
1440 create a data warehouse, linking relevant private and public data systems in order to receive near
1441 real-time data feeds from vital records, hospitals and other clinical partners. In the proposal, all
1442 efforts shall be made by the department and the center to limit duplicative reporting requirements
1443 by vital records, hospitals and other clinical partners. The proposal shall: (i) streamline the
1444 operation of applicable institutional review boards; (ii) engage academic partners to help support
1445 surveillance and evaluation activities; (iii) amend the department's reporting functions in order to
1446 allow for expedited reporting based on partially complete but statistically reliable data; and (iv)
1447 set forth the timeline for implementing the data warehouse. The warehouse shall be subject to the
1448 federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, 42 CFR Part 2 and all other
1449 applicable state and federal laws governing the confidentiality of personal data.

1450 The department, in consultation with the center, shall submit the implementation proposal
1451 and spending plan, as well as any additional legislative language necessary to implement the data
1452 warehouse project, not later than December 1, 2014, to the house and senate committees on ways
1453 and means, the joint committee on public safety and homeland security, the joint committee on
1454 health care financing and the joint committee on public health.

1455 SECTION 101. The board of registration of psychologists shall amend its regulations to
1456 include schools as health service training program sites to accrue supervised health service
1457 training hours applicable to licensure as a doctoral level psychologist with certification as a
1458 health services provider. Eligible training at a school site shall occur as part of a formal training
1459 affiliation between a school and an organized integrated training program; provided, however,
1460 that the organized integrated training program may provide a licensed psychologist to supervise
1461 doctoral trainees in clinical psychology if a school does not have a licensed psychologist as a
1462 member of the school staff.

1463 SECTION 102. There shall be a gun violence prevention commission to study primary
1464 prevention of gun violence.

1465 (a) The commission shall report to the governor and shall review and recommend
1466 programs and interventions to reduce gun violence and promote peace in the commonwealth.
1467 The commission shall make recommendations including, but not limited to: (i) promoting

1468 education in schools on gun violence and the social context of community violence including,
1469 but not limited to, poverty, race, socio-economic status, geographic location and gender; (ii)
1470 continuing research and education on gun trafficking and straw purchasing; (iii) building
1471 relationships between law enforcement and community members; (iv) improving services for
1472 homicide victims' families and families of perpetrators, including trauma and rehabilitation
1473 services; (v) improving post-prison planning and rehabilitation services; and (vi) reducing
1474 inequities in gun violence and prevention programming.

1475 (b) The commission shall consist of 1 expert on public health and gun violence who shall
1476 be appointed chair by the governor. The chair shall make recommendations to the governor to
1477 appoint the following: 1 representative from the department of public health; 1 representative
1478 from the department of mental health; 1 representative from the office of the attorney general; 1
1479 expert on public health; 1 expert on mental health; 1 representative from the department of
1480 correction; 1 representative from the department of public safety and security; 1 representative
1481 from the parole board; 2 victim advocates; 1 prisoner advocate; 1 mental health advocate; the
1482 house and senate chairs of the joint committee on public health; the house and senate chairs of
1483 the joint committee on mental health and substance abuse; and 4 public members from
1484 communities that are affected by gun violence.

1485 (c) The departments of public health, public safety and security and correction, the
1486 Boston public health commission and local boards of health and any other relevant departments
1487 shall be required to share relevant data, including data on crimes, accidents and suicides,
1488 stratified by race, ethnicity and gender, as needed by the commission, to better inform
1489 recommendations.

1490 (d) The commission shall submit a report at the end of each legislative session to the
1491 governor and the general court, the joint committee on public health and the joint committee on
1492 mental health and substance abuse. The report shall include data on gun violence and prevention
1493 in the commonwealth, recommendations for designing, implementing and improving gun
1494 violence prevention programs and services, including those that promote cultural competency,
1495 and proposals for legislative or regulatory changes to reduce gun violence and promote peace in
1496 the commonwealth. The final report shall be due by December 31, 2018.

1497 SECTION 103. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the chief of
1498 police in each city or town shall make reasonable efforts to enter into a memorandum of
1499 understanding with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives in the United
1500 States Department of Justice to analyze firearms trace data.

1501 SECTION 104. By December 3, 2014, the department of elementary and secondary
1502 education, subject to appropriation, shall adopt rules and regulations pursuant to section 95 of
1503 chapter 71 of the General Laws requiring that all public school districts shall provide suicide

1504 awareness and prevention training. School personnel hired after the effective date of this section
1505 but before December 3, 2014 shall obtain the training by March 4, 2015.

1506 SECTION 105. Sections 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 12, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 23, 25, 28, 29, 32, 34,
1507 36, 36A, 37, 39, 40, 41, 42, 45, 47, 48, 50, 53, 54, 58, 59, 61, 67, 68, 70, 71, 73, 74, 78, 82, 85,
1508 86, 88, 94, 95 and 96 shall take effect on January 1, 2015.

1509 SECTION 106. Section 10 shall take effect on July 1, 2015.

1510 SECTION 107. Sections 26 and 27 shall take effect on March 1, 2015; provided,
1511 however, that the chief information officer of the commonwealth, in conjunction with the
1512 secretary of public safety and security, shall procure any necessary information technology
1513 services to implement the real time web portal pursuant to said section 27 by October 1, 2014.

1514 SECTION 108. The first report under clause (10) of section 18 ³/₄ of chapter 6A of the
1515 General Laws shall be due not later than March 1, 2016.

1516 SECTION 109. Section 30 is hereby repealed.

1517 SECTION 110. Sections 21, 22, 31, 38, 43, 44, 46, 49, 51, 55, 56, 57, 60, 65, 69, 89 and
1518 109 shall take effect on January 1, 2021.
