Current Law: Chapter 13, section 80, boards of registration; membership; appointment; qualification. Section 81, term, Section 84, meetings; election officers; license; fees; powers and duties.

Summary: This bill will expand and increase the number of clinically trained social workers on the Board of Registration of Social Workers from 7 to 9, all of whom shall be appointed by the governor and be a resident of the Commonwealth. Each member shall serve for a term of 3 years and not more than 2 full consecutive terms.

This legislation would also restate the Board's operating rules and procedures to make them consistent with other Boards of Registration in the Division of Professional Licensure. Licensing and application fees collected by the Board shall be as prescribed by the executive office of administration and finance pursuant to section 3B of chapter 7 and shall be deposited into the trust fund established in section 35V of chapter 10.
