Overview of Gang Violence in MA

- Gang recruitment, violence and intimidation is a statewide problem.
- Across the United States, gangs are present in urban and larger suburban cities.
- There is no silver bullet for combating gang violence. A coordinated, statewide strategy of focused prosecutions, community-based law enforcement, and enhanced prevention programs do make a significant difference.

Senate Committee on Public Safety's 2005 Anti-Gang Agenda

Developed in coordination with Metropolitan Mayors Association, mayors from around the state, law enforcement and community groups.

- From "prevention to policing," a three-pronged approach because cities and towns can't be expected to do it alone:
 - → Prevention
 - → Policing
 - → Prosecution

GOAL: To give local communities tools and resources to combat gang violence.

Prevention

- Resources to support community-based violence prevention programs for at-risk youth.
 - Should work collaboratively with law enforcement, neighborhood leaders and local businesses.
 - Targeted at "High Impact" areas.
 - Ex. ROCA in Chelsea, MA.



Policing

- Target Community Policing grants to support local police department's anti-gang efforts.
 - Encourage communication between police on the street and neighborhood groups.
- Coordination between State Police Anti-Gang Unit and local law enforcement.
 - More involvement in communities throughout the state.
 - Additional minority and multilingual officers.
 - Creation of a ballistics fingerprinting database to track of guns in crimes.
- Regional approaches, linked to community organizations, encouraged through grant process.



Prosecution

- Establish a statewide witness protection program and stronger laws to prevent witness intimidation by gang members. (Supported by mayors, District Attorneys and Lieutenant Governor).
- Stay away orders as a condition of bail similar to restraining orders but for gang-related cases.
- Prohibiting the illegal use of grand jury transcripts to protect witnesses in gang-related cases.
- Increased mandatory penalties creating a minimum 5 year sentence for illegally carrying a loaded firearm.
